#### **GONE BUT NOT FORGOTTEN**





## **IRISH KITCHEN RECIPES**

## **GUINNESS CHOCOLATE CAKE BY CLODAGH MCKENNA**

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

260g/2¼ sticks plus 1 tbsp unsalted butter 300ml/1¼ cups Guinness

100g/1 cup cocoa powder

2 eggs

420g/2 cups plus 2 tbsps caster/superfine sugar

2 tsps vanilla essence

180ml/¾ cup buttermilk

300g/2½ cups plain/all purpose flour

2 tsp bicarbonate of soda

1 tsp baking powder

## For the icing

100g/7 tbsp unsalted butter, softened 300g/2½ cups sifted icing/confectioners sugar

1 tsp vanilla essence 300g/1¼ cups full-fat cream cheese

## METHOD:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 170°C /325°F/gas mark 3. Line the base of a 30cm round spring form tin with baking parchment.
- 2. To make the cake, heat the butter in a large saucepan over a medium heat until melted. Stir in the Guinness, then remove from the heat and stir in the cocoa powder.
- 3. In a large mixing bowl, whisk together the eggs, sugar, vanilla essence and buttermilk and then slowly add the Guinness mixture, whisking all the time.
- 4. In a separate large bowl, sieve together the flour, bicarbonate of soda and baking powder. Using an electric whisk, slowly pour the wet mixture into the dry ingredients and keep whisking until it is all well combined.
- 5. Transfer the mixture in to the cake tin and bake for approximately 45 minutes. Test to make sure the cake is cooked by inserted a dry skewer into the middle of the cake
- if it comes out clean, the cake is cooked. Set aside to cool a little, and then remove from the tin and allow to cool completely on a wire rack.
- 6. Meanwhile, make the icing by blending all the ingredients together using an electric hand whisk until light and fluffy.
- 7. Place the cooled cake on a plate and generously spread the icing on top. The cake will keep for up to 1 week in an airtight container.



## Ireland Through the Eyes of a Former Tour Guide: Spotlight on County Kerry

Hello fellow Society members! My name is Donal Lehane. I am a born and bred Irishman from County Kerry, living in Ottawa for the past two years. I was a tour guide in my home country, and would like to share my experience with you of my homeland's treasures.

If you are lucky enough to visit Ireland, County Kerry is a must. Home of the famous Ring of Kerry, the Kingdom (as it is known) has a lot to offer in both hospitality and scenery.

Killarney Town, also called "Beauty's Home", is a great base for exploring the region. The town centre is easily walkable, with lots of hotels, B&Bs and hostels. Killarney has a range of good restaurants, and its pubs are well-known for their homemade food, washed down with a creamy pint of Guinness, as well as live music. Local shops sell Irish-made crafts, knitwear and artwork.

An easy walk just on the edge of the town centre brings you to St Mary's Cathedral. Across the road, you can explore Killarney House, with its fabulous gardens, which are free to the public. The house itself, which is open for paying tours, sits on the edge of the Killarney National Park. The nearby HaHa (a roundabout) is a great place to book a ride in a jaunting cart. These carts, with their lively local drivers, are a great way to explore deeper into the Park.

Killarney National Park, with its gorgeous tall trees and stunning rhododendron bushes which are at their peak in spring, is also home to a number of must-see sites. These include Muckross House and Gardens, and the ruins of its former Abbey. Muckross was formerly a private home, and once boasted a visit from Queen Victoria. It is now owned by the state. There is a working farm housed on the former estate (much like Upper Canada Village), showing you Irish traditional life. Take time to walk the garden paths around the House. You can hear the horses clip-clopping as they pull jaunting carts filled with tourists around the grounds before taking you on to nearby Ross Castle.





Ross Castle, once owned by the O'Donoghue Clan, is now a ruin, sitting alongside Lough (Lake) Leane. May I suggest from this point you can take a boat tour from the pier next to the Castle, which is a beautiful lake trip showing the true beauty of Kerry.

From Killarney Town, you can also book some fabulous day trips, such as the Dingle Peninsula and the Ring of Kerry, through local tour operators – let a knowledgeable local guide drive on the other side of the road while you relax and enjoy the scenery!

The Ring of Kerry, so-called because of the circular shape of its route, will give you some of the most beautiful scenery Ireland has to offer, including views of the Atlantic Ocean. Your tour will also take you to Ladies' View, overlooking the stunning freshwater Lakes of Killarney, nestled up in the mountains that overlook the town. You will see beautiful Moll's Gap, with its views of the MacGillicuddy's Reeks mountains. As you drive down from the mountain, you will be welcomed by the sound of fresh mountain waters gushing down Torc Waterfall – a beautiful and romantic spot right back in the National Park.


